LONDON, April 2.—The Daily News this morning says that the government considers it unnecessary to despatch British troops to Khartoum.

The Remains of Prince Leopold.

London. April 3.—The remains of the Duke of Albany arrived at Cherbourg last evening and were placed on board the English royal yacht Osborne. A detachment of French infantry and marines presented arms while the coffin was being transferred to the steamer. The yacht afterwards sailed for England.
